



WHAT WE ARE WORKING ON

<u>Procedural Justice Training</u>: Teaching our officers to slow down and engage all in a meaningful way, allowing all to feel heard and respected.

<u>De-escalation training for all officers</u>: Giving officers the tools they need to resolve a situation by giving dialogue an opportunity before force.

<u>Citizen's Academy</u>: Engaging community members to teach them why we do what we do, allowing them to experience the same situations officers have to experience everyday.



WHAT WE HAVE ACCOMPLISHED

You Have Options: Re-defining how we handle sexual assault reporting.

Gateway Drug Amnesty and Treatment: Treatment as an option to arrest and/or incarceration.

Implicit Bias Training: Teaching officers and the community how unconscious programing effects daily decisions, recognizing & possibly re-writing the unconscious bias.

Body cams and in car cameras: Holding everyone accountable for their actions - police officers and the public alike.

Online officer complaint reporting: Allowing any member of the community to share a concern about an officer's behavior - anonymously if needed.

Online Policy Manual: Educating the community about our policies and practices, giving them the information they need to hold their police department accountable.

Community Engagement / Social Media: Building better relationships with all community members, specifically community members of color.

Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities training: Teaching officers how to better interact with community members on the autism spectrum.
