



Train Your Landscape to be Water Wise

Spring is the perfect time to prepare your landscape for the summer watering season. Did you know that in Ashland about 50 percent of our total water usage is used on our lawns and gardens? That's a lot of water! Fortunately, there are ways you can improve the efficiency of your landscape watering by completing a few simple tasks in the spring before the heat of the summer sets in. To promote a drought-tolerant landscape with a healthy root system, consider the following practices:

- **Pruning and cleaning** - is a simple way to start up positive and healthy growth for the year. Cleaning any dead debris away will allow the new growth to flourish and water to reach the roots effectively.
- **Avoid excess watering** - During the months of April and May and sometimes June, spring rains can provide water for our landscapes. Watering in addition to the spring rain can "spoil" your landscape and it can learn to expect excess water going into the summer. Pay attention to the weather and don't water if there is rain in the forecast.
- **Test your system** - Testing your irrigation system will help you assess if you may need to replace or repair any parts of your irrigation system. Getting this task done now will help ensure that your system is up and running efficiently before the hot summer months.
- **Add mulch & aerate** - Completing tasks such as aerating, amending soil, and adding mulch will sustain healthy soils that cycle nutrients, minimize runoff and retain water.
- **Reduce nitrogen fertilizer** - (can cause shallow rooting) and **increase potassium fertilizer** (enhances drought tolerance).
- **Add a pop of color** - If you are confident that Mr. Frost is retired for the year, this can be a great time to add new plants to your landscape. Plant native plants or plants adapted to drought and add mulch to your landscape to help lock in moisture and minimize evaporation.

More Mildfire, Less Wildfire

Controlled burns, or prescribed fires, are proven to reduce community wildfire risk and restore fire-adapted forests like ours. To do this important work, the Ashland Forest Resiliency Stewardship Project (AFR) is funded in part by a small assessment on your water bill to protect and restore our city and municipal watershed. This assessment amounts to \$175,000 a year. Since 2013, your investment not only paid for hundreds of acres of work (including controlled burns) and created living wage jobs, but it also leveraged over \$11 million in state and federal grants!

You will continue to see more controlled burns close to town this spring... because that's when it matters most. Burns are planned to keep as much smoke away from the community as possible, but sometimes weather forecasts don't pan out, or transient smoke settles into town overnight. State rules governing burning now allow low levels of smoke for short periods of time for critical work to protect communities like Ashland. For those of you who are smoke sensitive, avoid smoke exposure by closing windows, running air purifiers, staying indoors, and wearing an N95 mask if you must be outside. Lend Me A Plate (LMAP) Program

Most residents would agree that Ashlanders tend to care more about the climate, including what we can collectively do to reduce our imprint on the earth. One of the more unique, and completely free, resources available to residents interested in preventing waste is "Lend Me A Plate", or "LMAP" for short. Very few programs of this nature exist in other communities.

LMAP is volunteer-maintained by the Southern Oregon Master Recyclers in Action (SOMRA), and run out of the Ashland Recycle Center on Water Street. This program was launched in response to members of the community noticing the seemingly needless and wasteful overuse of disposable dishes, cups, plates, cutlery, and napkins thrown away at big events such as weddings, BBQs, and various event gatherings.

LMAP offers borrowers an alternative to using disposable items at events by offering durable, reusable options instead. This month, or Earth Month as it's called, please consider using LMAP for your next event or gathering where food will be served, and please remember to tell people about it.

Call 811 Before You Dig

Before beginning any outdoor digging project, call 811 at least two business days before you dig. Calling 811 will get a professional locator to your site to mark the approximate location of underground utility lines. There is a two-foot tolerance zone on each side of the line, and it is required to hand dig to determine the precise location of the utility in this tolerance zone. This service is free for homeowners. Remember, you may have your own utilities that require a Private Locate request at 811.

Knowing where underground utility lines are buried before you dig will help protect you from injury, prevent damage to utilities and service disruptions, and avoid potential fines and repair costs. Underground utility lines can be just about anywhere, so keeping your shovel in the shed or garage and calling 811 first is a smart move (and it's the law).

Every digging job requires a call — even small projects like planting trees and shrubs. The depth of utility lines varies and there may be multiple utility lines in a common area. Here are just a few examples of when to call:

- Installing a rural mailbox
- Putting in a fence
- Planting a tree or shrubbery
- Building a patio or deck
- Excavating a new garden area

New Fence Construction and the Wildfire Safety Ordinance

With the increasing loss of homes and lives due to wildfires, and with a history of fires and home loss in our own town, Ashland adopted stronger wildfire protection codes in late 2018. One of the new requirements addresses the construction of fences within the city. If any portion of a new fence connects to a structure, that portion of fence is required to be made largely of noncombustible materials within 5 feet of the connection to the structure. Fire science and unfortunate experiences have taught us that using noncombustible fencing where it attaches to a building or deck reduces the opportunity of a burning fence to ignite the exterior of the structure. What kind of fencing is considered non-combustible?


- A fence with wood framing and steel mesh or other noncombustible infill panels.
- A metal gate, a minimum of three feet in width, installed within a wood-framed fence immediately adjacent to a building or deck

Existing wood fences that are to be retrofitted to attach to a new building, addition, or deck, shall be retrofitted so the fence ends with a noncombustible material to keep fire from spreading to the building or deck. Combustible fencing materials may be permitted within five feet of a building or deck when the City staff and the Fire Department have determined the portion of the structure adjoining the combustible material is constructed with ignition-resistant building materials sufficient enough to reduce the spread of fire from combustible fencing materials. Please help reduce our wildfire exposure by following this new code and informing contractors of these requirements when beginning a project.
