Downtown Pedestrian Safety

The City of Ashland is adding “bumpouts” or curb extensions to five downtown intersections.



Bumpouts extend the corner curb at an intersection into the street thereby shortening the crosswalk and forcing motorists to slow down at those intersections. Improvements will meet ADA requirements with ramping and textured surfaces.

Intersections:

☐ ***Water Street/North Main/East Main Bumpout*** at the corner curb adjacent to Bluebird Park.

Weed Abatement Season

Beginning in mid May, Code Compliance staff will begin the annual Weed Abatement program.

The goal is to have all nuisance and hazard weeds, on all private and City lands, mowed at least once between mid May and June 15th per Ashland Municipal Code 9.04

*Due to the heavy rains this year, it is possible that some parcels will need more than one mow to stay in compliance. Weeds must be kept short (See *Weed Abatement Season*, Page 2)*

Curbside Recycling

Ashland Sanitary & Recycling has an extended curbside-recycling program. In-town customers are provided with a 65-gallon roll cart that will hold most household recyclables.

The cart can be used for newspaper, corrugated cardboard, plastic bottles #1-7, aluminum, phone books, magazines, catalogs, tin cans and some mixed waste paper (see the list below).

Use the small blue recycling bin for glass and motor oil.

Which mixed waste paper can I recycle?

Magazines, scrap paper, cereal and cracker boxes, labels from metal cans, office paper, opened mail, paper egg cartons, shredded paper (strips only), six-pack holders, shoe boxes, wrapping paper, phone books, paper bags, newspaper.

Which mixed waste paper is not recyclable?

Candy wrappers, foil, food contaminated paper (pizza boxes etc.),

- ❑ **Oak Street/East Main Bumpouts** at the corner curb in front of Accents and the corner curb at Wells Fargo Bank.
- ❑ **First/East Main Bumpout** at the corner curb near Washington Mutual Bank.
- ❑ **Oak and Lithia Way Bumpout** added to the corner curb at Wells Fargo Bank parking lot and to the corner curb at Sunshine Salon.
- ❑ **First and Lithia Way Bumpouts** at all four corners.

The City has contracted with LTM to construct the improvement. Work began in mid-April and should be completed by the end of May. For more information, call the Public Works Department at 488-5587. ▼

frozen food boxes, paper cups, paper plates, pet food bags, snack food bags, shredded paper (confetti style) stickers, tissue, waxed paper, milk carton and drink boxes.

What plastics can I recycle?

Any plastic bottle with a neck smaller than the base (milk jugs, pop bottles, juice containers, detergent bottles, water bottles, etc.) is acceptable. Please remove the lids and rinse the bottle.

What plastics are not recyclable?

Do not include margarine tubs, yogurt cups, plastic bags or any plastic bottle that contained motor oil, pesticides, herbicides or other hazardous materials.

Yard debris recycling is also available for an extra charge.

New Laws for Drivers Help Keep Pedestrians Safe

Senate Bill 591, which took effect January 1, 2006, makes turning at intersections with traffic signals and pedestrian crossings easier for drivers. The Bill allows motorists to make a turn at signaled intersections once a pedestrian is six feet across the lane next to the one a motorist wishes to turn into. This is slightly more than the width of a typical car. This bill created an exception to the 2004 law that required motorists to stop and wait until a pedestrian crossed both the driver's lane and the next lane before turning.

Under Oregon law, a crosswalk exists at any public street intersection, whether marked or unmarked. Crosswalks also exist between intersections (mid-block) where indicated.

At a traffic signal, drivers must:

- ❑ Stop and remain stopped for pedestrians until they have cleared

the lane in which the driver is traveling and the adjacent lane.

- ❑ Stop and remain stopped for pedestrians until they have cleared the lane into which the driver's vehicle is turning and at least 6 feet of the adjacent lane.

At any other crosswalk — those without a signal — drivers must:

- ❑ Stop and remain stopped for pedestrians until they have cleared the lane in which the driver is traveling or turning into and the adjacent lane.
- ❑ Always obey directions of crossing guards. ▼

Changes to the Safety Belt Laws

Under Oregon law, drivers are responsible for wearing safety belts and for ensuring that all passengers under age 16 are appropriately restrained. The law requires that children under age 4 and weighing less than 40 pounds ride in a child safety seat. Children over 4 years of age or weighing more than 40 pounds must ride in a booster seat until they reach both age 6 and weigh at least 60 pounds. Passengers over age 16 are themselves responsible for wearing a safety belt.

In addition, adult passengers traveling in taxicabs or commercial shuttles and vans now are responsible for properly restraining children traveling with them — as well as themselves — under a new Oregon law that took effect January 1, 2006.

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death and injury among children. Last year in Oregon, traffic crashes injured 1,297 children under age 10 and killed 14, according to preliminary data for ODOT's 2005 Crash analysis Unit. More than 60 percent of children injured or killed in traffic crashes were not using a child safety seat or booster. This means they were either using

no restraints at all or were using improperly fitting adult lap and shoulder belts. By strict adherence to the law we can reduce this number to zero!
