## Annual Salmon Festival

On Saturday, October 7, the North Mountain Park Nature Center will host its 3rd Annual Salmon Festival from 11 am to 4 pm at 620 North Mountain Avenue in Ashland. The event is free and offers activities for all ages and information on how to help protect and enhance salmon habitat, including water and energy saving ideas. Learn about local salmon habitat conservation and restoration efforts, observe wild salmon up close and personal with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife's 350 gallon salmon tank.

Participants can purchase a wild salmon barbeque, checkout exhibits and activities and enjoy live entertainment from bands *Montana Sour* and the *Rutendo Marimba Band*. Native American demonstrations will take place throughout the day and will include traditional salmon cooking around an open fire, traditional uses of plants, drumming and storytelling. Wild salmon will be cooked, using a traditional open fire method and dinners will be available for purchase. This event will

## New Laws for School Zone Safety

In 2005, the Oregon legislature acted to simplify the school zone traffic laws under House Bill 2840.

The law has two categories of school zones:

**Condition A:** Crosswalk is next to school grounds.


**Condition B:** Crosswalk is away from school grounds.

Drivers should be aware of these two conditions.

## Low Income Assistance

Once again, the City of Ashland has set aside money during the budget process for the Ashland Low Income Energy Assistance Program to assist low-income Ashland residents with electric bill costs during the cold winter months. Recipients will be Ashland residents with household incomes not greater than 125% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines for 2006.

Applicants may call City Hall at 552-2038 to request an application packet which will provide information on needed documents and screening dates and locations.

## Ride The Bus

The bus fare in Ashland is \$.50. Fares to areas outside Ashland are \$2.00. The City of Ashland is committed to providing affordable public transportation and will spend approximately \$290,000 to "buy down" the fare for Ashland riders. Ashland riders can request a transfer, good for 90 minutes. The transfer allows riders to get off the bus in Ashland and get back on the bus within 90 minutes at no charge for service within the city limits.

Bus #10 serves Ashland from Medford via Phoenix and Talent on Highway 99. It circles through

Ashland and then returns to Medford. Service is approximately every 30 minutes. The bus runs Monday through Friday from 5:30 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. There is no weekend service. The Ashland fare begins at the Jackson Well Springs on the north end of town and at the Ashland Hills Inn on the south end of town. Transfers are available for \$2.00 to areas outside of Ashland.

People wishing to ride the bus outside of Ashland may purchase tokens and passes at City Hall in Ashland.

### **Full fare rates outside Ashland**

- \$20.00 for ten \$2.00 tokens.
- \$70.00 for a monthly pass for unlimited rides.

### **Discounted fare rates outside Ashland**

- Seniors 65 and older
- Youth 10 - 17 (under 10 ride free)
- \$10.00 for ten tokens.
- \$35.00 for a monthly pass for unlimited rides. ▼

### **Work Zone Safety**

The Ashland Traffic Safety Commission reminds drivers to be extra careful when traveling through work zones.

- When you see orange signs, barrels and barricades, slow down you are entering a work zone.
- Don't tailgate. Extend the distance between your car and the one ahead.
- Work zone traffic lanes are

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narrow and don't have shoulders or emergency lanes.

- ❑ Be aware of temporary entrances to the roadway from the median.
- ❑ Expect delays. Plan for them and be patient.
- ❑ Call 511 for the latest traffic, weather and highway conditions.
- ❑ View [www.tripcheck.com](http://www.tripcheck.com) to check routes, work zones or bad weather conditions before you begin your trip.

### Prepare with CERT!

September is National Preparedness Month. The City of Ashland's Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) will offer its Basic Training Intensive over two weekends beginning September 29. This all-hazards training prepares citizens to take care of themselves, their families and their neighborhoods in disaster. All First Aid and Fire courses are taught by Ashland firefighter paramedics. The 20-plus hour training is free.

Training includes emergency first aid and triage, light search and rescue, extrication of trapped victims, gas and electric shut-off, fire suppression, disaster psychology, incident command-team structure, family preparedness.

### Emergency Preparedness Community Forum


Ashland CERT is hosting a community forum on emergency preparedness on September 13, 7:00 p.m. Southern Oregon University Stevenson Union.
