Founded in 1905 by Gilbert Pierson, John Muir and George Grinnell, this was one the the nation's first environmental organizations

This president signed into law the formation of the Environmental Protection Agency

He preserved nearly 90,000 acres not far from Ashland as the Cascade-Siskiyou National Monument.

When this lake – or more exactly the Cuyahoga River which flows into this lake – caught fire in 1969, it ignited a firestorm of public outrage over the indiscriminate dumping of sewage and industrial chemicals into the Great Lakes. Name this lake

His love of the sea and all its creatures led him to a lifetime of producing documentaries about the oceans that have been seen by millions. Though he was not particularly a religious man, he believed that the teachings of the different major religions provide valuable ideals and thoughts to protect the environment.

Writer, adventurer, friend of presidents, founder of the Sierra Club, this immigrant can arguably be considered the most influential environmentalist of the American West.

Now a national Monument, this facility welcomed millions of immigrants coming to America from 1892 to 1954. Today, over 100 million Americans—or something of about one-third of the population—can trace their ancestry to the immigrants who first arrived in America here before dispersing to points all over the country.
