People all across the country are using less water than they used to by shutting off faucets, fixing leaks, and installing more efficient appliances and fixtures.

Sanding and Snow Removal

Following a snowfall, streets are cleared and sanded in the following order:

1. Arterial streets, including Siskiyou Blvd., North Main, Ashland Street (Highway 66), Lithia Way, Maple Street (hospital), school zones, etc. are always cleared first.
2. Collector streets, such as Mountain Avenue, East Main, Hersey Street, Park Street, and Beach Street are cleared next.
3. Residential streets are cleared last and are prioritized based on volume of vehicular traffic and grade. Residential streets with heavy volume, such as Morton Street, Strawberry Lane, Wimer Street, Church Street, and Granite Street are attended to first. Low priority is given to streets with low vehicular traffic.

The Street Division of the Public Works Department reminds motorists that a plowed and sanded street is not guaranteed to be free from ice. Motorists should exercise caution when traveling

Did You Know?

With Winter in full swing, there is often confusion over who is responsible for maintaining and clearing sidewalks. Per Ashland Municipal Code (Chapter 13.04.020), “It is the duty of the owners of land adjoining any street to maintain in good repair and to remove obstructions from the adjacent sidewalk.” In other words, clearing the sidewalk of snow or ice is the responsibility of the owner of the property immediately adjacent to the sidewalk. If we all work together, we can keep our sidewalks safe! ▼

How much can you save? It all depends on how much you’re using right now. Estimate your water use and potential savings with the

Alliance for Water Efficiency’s Home Water Works Calculator at <http://www.home-water-works.org>.

In addition, most single-family and multi-family homes’ sewer rates are established based on the average water usage in the months of January, February, and March. Therefore, by reducing your water usage in the winter months, you could lower your sewer bills for the rest of the year.

Here are some ways you can save water inside your home:

- Check for leaks and fix them promptly.
- Take shorter showers.
- Turn off the faucet when not in use.
- Wash full loads of dishes and laundry.
- Replace old inefficient fixtures with new water efficient WaterSense models.

A family of four could reduce its indoor water use by up to 60%

when replacing old toilets, showerheads, bathroom aerators and washing machines.

Low Income Assistance

The City of Ashland Low Income Energy Assistance Program, which assists low-income residents with electric bill costs during the cold winter months, is now accepting applications. Eligible Ashland residents include those whose income is at or below 60 percent of Oregon’s median income. These levels are based on household income and household size. Applicants may call 541-552-2038 or go to the Utility Billing counter at City Hall for an application packet. The deadline to submit the application is January 31, 2015. Late or incomplete applications will not be considered. ▼



Vehicle Registration

If you are buying or selling a vehicle don't forget to turn over the registration form, fill out the new ownership information, and return the form to the Department of Motor vehicles (DMV) in a timely fashion.

The State of Oregon and the City of Ashland use vehicle registration information for tracking and monitoring of abandoned and stored vehicles. The information can also assist the Ashland Police Department in avoiding impounding or citing vehicles, saving citizens time and money.

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HeartSaver CPR Adult

HeartSaver CPR is a classroom, video based, instructor led course that teaches adult CPR and AED use, as well as how to relieve choking on an adult. This course is for anyone with limited or no medical training who needs a course completion card in CPR and AED use to meet job, regulatory, or other requirements.

The cost for this course is \$35, which includes a student study book and course completion card. All fees must be prepaid prior to the class date to confirm reservation. Registration is first-come, first-served according to when class fees are paid. Classes are typically limited to eight people.
