Dear Natalie;

The following is a final report for the Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon (YSSO). The YSSO received a grant award of \$7,000 from the City of Ashland in July 2017. The funding helped underwrite Ashland performances and concert-production expenses during the organization's 30th Anniversary Concert Season. Attached are Statements of Financial Activity & Position for July 1, 2017-June 30, 2018. Though the organization's fiscal year ended June 30, 2018, City of Ashland grant funding was expended prior to the close of the fiscal year.

Performing Ensembles/Musicians: The YSSO organization includes two full symphony orchestras: *Youth Orchestra* (preparatory orchestra) and *Youth Symphony* (advanced symphony). Placement in each orchestra was through an annual audition, but all qualified musicians were encouraged participate. Musicians began rehearsals for the season in September. Each year, musicians rehearse for several hours on Sunday (plus additional evening final "dress rehearsals" for all *Youth Symphony* and *Youth Orchestra* musicians). Additional rehearsals are scheduled for the musicians involved in other special performances. More than 13 musicians were selected to play in a YSSO ensemble during the *2017-2018 Concert Season*. Musicians in the YSSO include high school, middle school and elementary school age musicians from Ashland, Medford, Grants Pass, other Rogue Valley communities and university students.

Concerts: Auditions and rehearsals began in September. Audition and rehearsal locations included Southern Oregon University and high schools in Medford and Grants Pass. *Fall Concert Series* performances were presented in November 2017 at the Collier Center's Craterian Theater in Medford and the Oregon Center for the Arts Recital Hall at Southern Oregon University (SOU) in Ashland. The *Youth Symphony* played W.A. Mozart's *Flute Concerto No. 2 in D Major, K314* featuring Courtney Badura, Youth Symphony principal flute and a winner of the 2017 Concerto Competition. The *Youth Symphony* also played *Symphony No. 5 in C minor, Op. 67*, by Ludwig van Beethoven. The *Youth Orchestra* presented arrangements of the "March" from the opera *Carmen* by Georges Bizet (arr. Woodhouse), Edward Elgar's *Pomp & Circumstance March No. 4* (arr. Isaac) and the overture to Giuseppe Verdi's opera *Nabucco* (arr. Dackow). Both orchestras were led by Cynthia Hutton.

In celebration of the 30th season, the YSSO presented a *Youth Symphony & Alumni Concert* at the Craterian Theater in Medford in December 2017. The *Youth Symphony* was joined by 28 alumni and accomplished guest soloists including former Ashland musicians Abby Young, violin, Gabe Young, oboe, and Shaina Evoniuk, electric violin, as well as violinists Kathleen Strahm and Heidi Strahm Smith. The concert featured a work by contemporary composer Steve Reich, and music by Richard Wagner, J.S. Bach, Piotr I. Tchaikovsky and Leroy Anderson.

The annual Youth Symphony Concerto Competition was held in January in Ashland at the Oregon Center for the Arts Recital Hall at Southern Oregon University. principal bassoon of the Youth Symphony, Caleb Hutchings, was selected to play with the Youth Symphony in November 2018 as a soloist during the 2018-2019 Concert Season.

The Winter Concert Series performances in February 2018 were presented at the Collier Center's Craterian Theater in Medford. The concerts showcased a new collaboration with the Rogue Valley Youth Choruses (Cantare & Youth Ensemble) augmented by choral ensembles from North Medford High School and South Medford High School. The choral/orchestral works included the chorus The Promise of Living from Aaron Copland's opera "The Tender Land" and the first movement of John Rutter's Gloria. The Youth Symphony also played Piotr I. Tchaikovsky's Romeo and Juliet Overture-Fantasy. The Youth Orchestra played movement four of Antonin Dvorak's Symphony No. 9 ("From the New World"), M. L. Daniels' Festique and Richard Wagner's Suite from Tannhäuser. More than 250 accomplished instrumental and choral musicians participated in the Winter Concert Series performances.

Spring Concert Series performances recently took place in Ashland, Grants Pass and Medford on May 18, 19 & 20, 2018. Concert programming included the *Youth Symphony* performing *Symphony No. 4 in E minor, op. 98 (mvts. 2, 3 & 4)* by Johannes Brahms. The *Youth Orchestra* played the popular *Hungarian Dance No. 5 in G minor* by Brahms (arr. Bauernschmidt), the folk dance-inspired *Huapango Del Oso* by contemporary composer Gabriel Musella and music from the 2007 Walt Disney Studios film *Pirates of The Caribbean: At World's End* by Hans Zimmer (arr. Lavender & Longfield). Both orchestras were led by YSSO music director Dr. Cynthia Hutton.

In addition to the Concert Series and Youth Symphony & Alumni Concert performances, the Youth Symphony, Youth Orchestra and Concerto Competition musicians presented three Community Outreach Concerts for the residents of the Rogue Valley Manor.

In October, the YSSO co-sponsored an in-service clinic for string instrument teachers and school orchestra directors led by Dr. Dijana Ihas, president-elect of the Oregon Chapter of the American String Teachers Association and associate professor of music education at Pacific University. The Southern Oregon Music Education Association, local school districts and Southern Oregon University collaborated on the workshop.

Access: It is the policy of the YSSO organization that all qualified student musicians may participate in the YSSO regardless of financial circumstances. *Scholarships* reduce economic barriers to participation and offer assistance to YSSO student musicians and families through full/partial tuition waivers and support for private lessons with established teaching professionals. Last season, more than 32 percent of the YSSO musicians selected to participate this season received tuition waivers and/or lesson assistance (totaling \$12,467).

Each season, the YSSO offers *Complimentary Tickets* to musicians, music teachers and students in order to provide access to *Concert Series* performances in the larger venues. A student ticket discount price of \$5.00 is offered for *Concert Series* performances as well. Last season 1,238 complimentary tickets (a total value of \$6,190 in student \$5 tickets) have been provided to musicians, music teachers, family members and music coaches. Holders of the Oregon Trail Card were offered half-price discounts for general admission tickets.

Support/Revenue: In addition to funding awarded by the City of Ashland, the Carpenter Foundation, Oregon Arts Commission, James F. & Marion L. Miller Foundation and the Carrico Family Foundation awarded operating support for 2017-2018. Foundations that provided support for *Education & Outreach Initiatives* last season included the Cow Creek Umpqua Indian Foundation, Pacific Power Foundation and Trust Management Services, LLC (Braemar Charitable Trust). The YSSO is the sole beneficiary of the Roger G. Hewitt Fund for Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon of The Oregon Community Foundation. An annual distribution from this fund helps support tuition and/or lesson assistance for YSSO musicians. The YSSO established an Endowment Partner Fund with The Oregon Community Foundation in 2006 (distributions are reinvested). The YSSO maintains a cash reserve.

Anna Dunlap gave Concert Partner support for the *Youth Symphony & Alumni Concert*. Neil & Sharon Wilson were *Spring Concert Series* Partners. Contributions from businesses and annual gifts from individuals provide revenue for programs, concerts and operations. Members of the governing board coordinated two fund raising events this season: the "Short Stack for a Good Cause" pancake breakfast in November and a Silent Auction in May. Numerous local businesses and organizations donated items and gift certificates for the auction.

Community Involvement: Parent and community volunteers assist with special events, rehearsals and concerts. The work of the organization could not be carried out without the assistance of these individuals. Board and parent volunteer coordinators work with staff to organize, coordinate and manage volunteer tasks and recruitment. Businesses place advertising in the concert programs and many businesses assist with fund raising events each year.

Rehearsals/Training: In addition to weekly full ensemble rehearsals from September through mid-May, Sectional Rehearsals (mini masterclasses) led by professional musicians, many of whom are members of the Rogue Valley Symphony, are provided to YSSO musicians in each ensemble. The music coaches work with instrument groups (violin I, violin II, viola, cello, bass, brass, flute, clarinet, oboe, bassoon) on music technique, performance skills and concert repertoire. The YSSO increased the number of sectionals provided to the musicians this season in order to offer additional instructional time.

Evaluation: The YSSO organization uses various tools and methods to evaluate organizational effectiveness, and to assess the progress of the musicians including observation, written evaluations, recordings, questionnaires and attendance. Music coaches who lead sectional sessions confer with staff. Concert recordings may be used to measure technical and interpretive skills. Musician evaluations are distributed and findings are tabulated each spring.

Directors and staff are continuing to use a Balanced Scorecard (BSC) tool to set targets and expectations, monitor progress and accountability, and to create action plans. BSC objectives include community enrichment/audience engagement, musician engagement/participation, board engagement/accountability/development, employee engagement/accountability/staffing patterns, volunteer engagement, fiscal responsibility/stewardship of resources and fund/revenue development. The tool informs planning discussions and helps board and staff members evaluate effectiveness and assess performance. Measures include concert attendance, financial assistance for musicians, enrollment, annual pledge/gifts by board members, board recruitment/cultivation, board self-assessment participation, annual key staff performance evaluation, volunteer needs/participation and revenue sources. The results are tracked and reported to the governing board on a quarterly basis at board meetings. Action plans are created for each objective with timelines, quarterly results/status, tasks and individual/committee assignments.

The YSSO has offered an orientation to new directors and provides a manual for governance and corporate documents, reference materials and reports. The board conducts an annual self-assessment. An annual retreat and meetings include BSC updates, reports and presentations on fund development, risk assessment, board development, inclusion/diversity or other topics. Board and staff developed job descriptions employment agreements, performance measures and evaluation tools. The board president leads an annual review of key staff.

Governance: A volunteer governing board of 10 community members guided the YSSO organization last season. Governing board standing committees include a Finance Committee, Fund Development Committee, Governance Committee and Executive Committee. The board creates *ad hoc* working groups to research and investigate issues and opportunities when needed. An *ad hoc* group planned some of the special programming and activities for the 30th season. The annual full-day board retreat at the beginning of each season include work sessions, business meetings and presentations on organizational effectiveness, life cycles of organizations, diversity, risk assessment, board development and fund development, community networking, planning models and other topics. Each director receives a board handbook for materials, reports, financial information and non-profit board resources.

Recognition by City of Ashland and the financial assistance were important to the success of the Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon's 30th Anniversary Concert Season. The city's support enabled the YSSO organization to maintain artistic quality, develop partnerships, deliver outstanding learning opportunities, offer access to music education and present affordable public performances. Additionally, the funding leveraged significant support from other funders.

Thank you again for investing in the Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon. The musicians, families, volunteers, staff and board members, and thousands of citizens who attend the inspiring performances appreciate the Foundation's financial assistance and its support of the values, mission and programs of the YSSO organization.

Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon 30th Anniversary Concert Season Overview

The Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon (YSSO), a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization, was honored to receive \$7,000 from the City of Ashland for YSSO fiscal year July 1, 2017-June 30, 2018. The grant award supported Ashland performances, music coach honoraria, venue fees, music, concert materials, printing, general costs and concert production related expenses during the YSSO organization's 30th Anniversary Concert Season. Foundation funding augmented financial support from other foundations and funding sources. The following offers an overview of concerts, programming, initiatives and activities offered by the Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon last season.



Ensembles/Musicians: The YSSO organization includes two full orchestras: *Youth Orchestra* (preparatory/intermediate level) and *Youth Symphony* (advanced). Placement in an orchestra was through the annual audition, but all qualified musicians were encouraged participate. Rehearsals began in September and continued through mid-May.

The orchestras rehearsed weekly throughout the season. More than 130 local and college musicians were selected to play in a YSSO

orchestra during the 2017-2018 Concert Season. The two orchestras included high school, middle school and elementary school age musicians from Ashland, Medford, Grants Pass, and other Rogue Valley communities, as well as students at Southern Oregon University and Rogue Community College. In addition to the local and college musicians who played in the Youth Symphony or Youth Orchestra during the season, an additional 28 former YSSO musicians from throughout the country returned to participate in the Youth Symphony & Youth Symphony Alumni Concert.



Concerts: Fall Concert Series the Collier Center's Craterian Arts Music Recital Hall at The music performed by the Concerto No. 2 in D Major, Courtney Badura, Youth Concerto Competition. The



performances were presented in November 2017 at Theater in Medford and the Oregon Center for the Southern Oregon University (SOU) in Ashland. *Youth Symphony* included W.A. Mozart's *Flute K314* featuring North Medford High School senior Symphony principal flute and a winner of the 2017 Youth Symphony also played *Symphony No. 5 in C*

minor, Op. 67, by Ludwig van Beethoven. The *Youth Orchestra* presented arrangements of the "March" from the opera *Carmen* by Georges Bizet (arr. Woodhouse), Edward Elgar's *Pomp & Circumstance March No. 4* (arr. Isaac) and the overture to Giuseppe Verdi's opera *Nabucco* (arr. Dackow). Both orchestras were led by Cynthia Hutton, D.M.A.

Each season, the YSSO offers *Complimentary Tickets* to musicians, music teachers, families and students in order to provide access to *Concert Series* performances in the larger venues. A student ticket discount price of \$5 is offered for *Concert Series* performances as well. Last season, 1,238 complimentary (free) tickets/seats for *Concert Series* performances - a total value of \$6,190 in student price \$5 tickets - were set aside and given to YSSO musicians/families, music teachers, choral musicians/families and conductors, and music coaches. Holders of the Oregon Trail Card were offered discounted general admission tickets. Over the entire season, attendance at YSSO performances totaled more than 3400.

Hewitt Fund for Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon of The Oregon Community Foundation. The annual distribution from this fund helped support tuition and/or lesson assistance for YSSO musicians.


