Options for Helping Residents of Ashland

Ashland Affordable Housing Trust Fund Application **March 11, 2022**

1. Introduction

OHRA has operated in Ashland since 2014 helping low-income Jackson County residents build better lives. By offering hope and access to social service resources, we encourage those in need on the path to self-sufficiency. OHRA has 3 programs:

- 1. The OHRA Community Resource Center (OCRC) where economically stressed people can meet acute needs and/or find resources for long-term sustainability. There are three interconnected services:
 - a. Housing Match helps unhoused people move into permanent housing and people under threat of eviction to remain housed.
 - b. Job Match providing resumé preparation, coaching and job search.
 - c. Essential Services help people resolve barriers to sustainability including obtaining birth certificates and/or identification, help applying for benefits such as SSI/SSDI and referrals to health and social services.

In addition to the services OHRA provides, once renovations are complete, the OCRC will have space for other organizations to provide complementary wrap-around services thereby creating a one-stop human service hub.

- 2. The OHRA Emergency Shelter (OES), operates year-round with resource navigation designed to promote stability. The OES provides non-congregate emergency housing for adults who are living outdoors or in other settings not appropriate for human habitation. When renovations are complete the OES will have capacity to serve house up to 72 individuals for up to 6 months as they work with OHRA's Resource Navigators (case managers) to find the resources to move into permanent housing. Given historic turn-over rates we project serving up to 240 people per year.
- 3. The OHRA Laundry/Shower Trailer (OLST), where unhoused people access basic hygiene service.

The OCRC and OES are located in the OHRA Center at 2350 Ashland Street. The OLST is currently deployed two days per week at The Grove.

2. Project Description

This project addresses the City of Ashland's affordable housing deficit through two programs to provide immediate relief for unhoused residents and those who are at risk of becoming unhoused. The project period is OHRA's FY 2022-23 which begins on July 1, 2022.

1. **Housing Match:** This request will help OHRA's resource center provide emergency rental assistance to Ashland residents who face eviction because of inability to pay rent or unhoused residents who are seeking to become housed and need financial assistance to pay move in costs. In both cases recipients must have a demonstrated ability to remain stable in housing after receiving this one-time assistance. Payments are made directly to

landlords. The requested funds will also help OHRA expand the number of available resource navigators who are key to helping guests find resources to become stable. At the present time the is a three-week waiting list for appointments with navigators. If funded, this request will help OHRA to serve at least 1,300 individuals during the project year.

2. **Emergency Housing at the OHRA Emergency Shelter:** OHRA requests funds for general operating costs including staff salaries of the OES. If funded, this request will help the shelter to serve up to 240 individuals during the project year.

3. Project Experience

The Housing Match program has been a core program of the OCRC since it began operating in 2014. In those eight years, the program has helped more than 520 unhoused families or individuals move into permanent housing and assisted more than 980 housing threatened families to remain housed. During this period OHRA has partnered with Ashland faith communities and other organizations to supplement grants from the city, foundation and businesses, and gifts from private individuals to the housing match fund. Our staff also worked closely with landlords and rental agencies to find affordable housing or to arrange payment plans that prevent evictions. (A list of our partners is attached).

The OES opened on April 1, 2021, and as of January 31, 2022, had housed 165 individuals. Prior to that, OHRA operated the OHRA Winter Shelter from November to March beginning in 2018.

4. Funding Request

As detailed in the attached budget, OHRA requests \$179,000 for the Housing Match program and the OHRA Shelter. This request is approximately 9.2% of the total program cost. The budget shows other funds that are either confirmed or proposed.

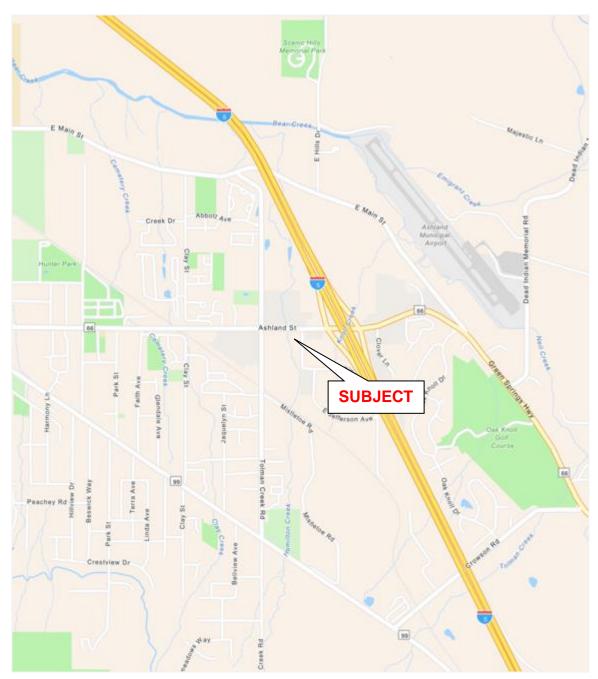

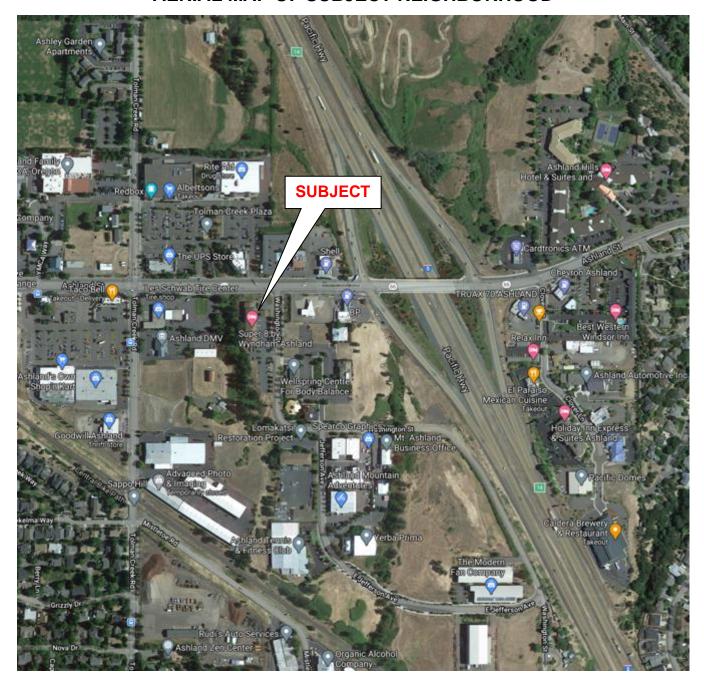
