CITY OF ASHLAND ETHICS RULES (AMC 3.08.020)

- 1. Part of purpose of City ethics code is to prevent public officials from "unwittingly entangling public and private interests"
- 2. Must be "independent, impartial and responsible to the people"
- 3. Must "discharge faithfully the duties of your office regardless of personal considerations, recognizing that the public interest must be your primary concern."
- 4. Cannot use public office "for personal gain"
- 5. Cannot "grant any special consideration, treatment or advantage to any citizen beyond that which is available to every other citizen, except as otherwise permitted by law or ordinance."
- 6. Cannot take *any action* in the course of duties as a public official the effect of which would be to the private financial gain or loss of you, relatives, or those with whom you have a close business relationship, whether paid or unpaid, *without first disclosing* such potential gain or loss.
- 7. Cannot *recommend*, approve, award, enter into or authorize a City transaction, contract, purchase or sale to which one of the parties is you, a relative, or a business entity in which you or a relative has a substantial or controlling interest. (Note: "Substantial or controlling interest" in an affected business entity requires recusal not just disclosure.)
- 8. Cannot solicit or accept gifts, favors, services, compensation, retainers or promises of future employment from a source with a legislative or administrative interest in your duties or in anticipation of an action that may be taken your official capacity.
- 9. Cannot accept a retainer or compensation that is contingent on a specific action by the City
- 10. Cannot use confidential information or information not readily available to the public for personal gain or to benefit private interests at the expense of or in conflict with the public interest.
 - a. Information that is public may nevertheless not be readily available to the public if a special request is required to obtain the information or if special knowledge, such as that acquired as a public official, is needed to take advantage of the information.
- 11. Cannot disclose confidential information.
- 12. Cannot appear on behalf of a client for a fee or pro bono before the board or commission to which that official is appointed.

I. FINANCIAL CONFLICT OF INTEREST ANNOUNCEMENTS

(ACTUAL OR POTENTIAL)

A. Background. Under state law, a public official must publicly announce the nature of a financial conflict of interest and whether it is "actual" or only "potential." If it is only potential, the announcement itself provides a legal shield and enables participation in deliberation and voting on the matter with respect to which a potential conflict exists. The relevant sections of ORS 244.120 are excerpted below.

ORS 244.120

- (2)An elected public official, other than a member of the Legislative Assembly, or an appointed public official serving on a board or commission, shall:
 - (a)When met with a potential conflict of interest, announce publicly the nature of the potential conflict prior to taking any action thereon in the capacity of a public official; or (b)When met with an actual conflict of interest, announce publicly the nature of the actual conflict and:
 - (A) Except as provided in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph, refrain from participating as a public official in any discussion or debate on the issue out of which the actual conflict arises or from voting on the issue.
 - (B)If any public officials vote is necessary to meet a requirement of a minimum number of votes to take official action, be eligible to vote, but not to participate as a public official in any discussion or debate on the issue out of which the actual conflict arises:
- (3) Nothing in subsection (1) or (2) of this section requires any public official to announce a conflict of interest more than once on the occasion which the matter out of which the conflict arises is discussed or debated.

Of course, a public official can decline to participate in consideration of a particular matter out of concern for the appearance of a conflict of interest even if there is only a potential conflict or not even a potential one. But even in that case, the public official must announce the nature of the conflict that prompts the non-participation.

And, under Ashland's ordinances, a public official who is present and does not vote on a motion or question put to a vote by the presiding officer is counted as having cast a negative vote, except when a majority of the voting body has excused the official because of an announced potential or actual conflict of interest.

B. Disclosure Statements When State Ethics Code Applies

A. Background.

1. An announcement of an actual or potential financial conflict of interest could begin with a statement along the following lines at the very start of consideration of the agenda item:
I [or my family member] [own? manage? work for?] the [business or nonprofit entity]. I believe that any action on this agenda item [could possibly have? would have?] a positive or negative financial impact on me, my family, or [business or nonprofit entity identified above] in that the following financial consequences [could possibly? would?] occur:
1.A. <u>POTENTIAL CONFLICT ONLY.</u> If the conflict is only "potential" and the public official will participate in consideration of the matter, a statement along the following lines would be appropriate:
I openly acknowledge and disclose these private roles and interests and declare that I will strive to, and I believe I am able to, exercise independent, objective judgment on this agenda item, making the public interest my primary concern regardless of personal considerations.
1.B. <u>ACTUAL CONFLICT</u> . If, however, the conflict is "actual," a statement along the following lines would be appropriate:
In light of this actual conflict, I should not participate in consideration of this matter and plan step out of the room until the following agenda item is taken up. Since excusing me from voting on this matter requires approval of a majority of the voting members present I request that a motion be made, seconded, and voted on to allow me to abstain from voting on this matter.
II. DISCLOSURE STATEMENTS CONCERNING POTENTIAL INFLUENCE OF PERSONAL CONSIDERATIONS WHEN THERE ARE NO FINANCIAL IMPACTS

Nor shall any public official, whether paid or unpaid, engage in any business or participate in any proposed or current city transaction, contract, purchase or sale which is potentially incompatible with a proper discharge of that public official's official duties or which would tend to impair independence of judgment or action in the performance of that public official's official duties without first disclosing such potential incompatibility or impairment of independent judgment or action to the proper authority. For elected officials, such disclosure shall be made in an open meeting to the elected body in which the official serves.

EXCERPT FROM AMC 3.08.020E.1 (with parts relevant to non-financial interests in bold):

B. STATEMENTS BY FIRST PUBLIC OFFICIAL

- 1. There is not even a remote conjectural possibility that the outcome of this agenda item would have a positive or negative financial impact on me, my family, or any entity with which I'm associated. As a result, the type of disclosure required by state ethics law is not called for here. Under Ashland's ethics code, AMC 3.08.020E(1)(b), if my position as......[description of position or activities related to the agenda item] would tend to impair my independence of judgment or action, I am to disclose that tendency to you but can still participate in the deliberation and voting on this matter.

The City offered a total of \$294,413 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds for award to eligible applicants. The total amount of CDBG funds available to award to capital improvement projects in Program year 2017 is \$294,413. \$23,808, is available for award to Public Service activities (which is 15% of the anticipated 2018 Program Year allocation). The City has received three applications totaling \$81,653, one application for capital improvement totaling \$49,653 and two applications for public service funding totaling \$32,000

The anticipated CDBG allocation to the City of Ashland for the 2018 Program Year is \$158,726. Of this amount 20% is reserved for program administration (\$31,745), leaving \$126,981 in funds available for to award to eligible activities. The City also had \$167,432 in funds from prior program years unspent funding that may also be awarded to eligible projects benefiting Ashland's low-income population.

The City of Ashland Housing and Human Services Commission will hold a public hearing on March 22, 2018 to review the grant requests and make a recommendation to forward to the City Council for consideration. The Council will make the final award selections at a public hearing scheduled for April 17, 2018. Staff's eligibility assessment of each of the proposals received, and recommendations regarding the allocation of the 2018 CDBG funds are provided on the following pages.

Funding Requested/Available

A total of approximately \$294,413 in CDBG funds is expected to be available to distribute to eligible recipients for projects meeting the CDBG national objectives, and which are consistent with the City of Ashland 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan. The maximum allocation allowable to be used to support public services is limited to approximately \$23,808.

These funds will be available upon approval of the 2018 Action Plan, and upon the completion of any regulatory requirements including but not limited to environmental review clearance. Upon completion of the Action Plan a public hearing for review and approval will be held before the Housing and Human Services Commission to insure consistency with the awards designated by the City Council. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) must review the annual Action Plan submitted by the City to ensure the activities funded are consistent with federal requirements, and with the local Consolidated Plan. The City will reserve the right to award more or less than this estimate dependent on the final entitlement amount authorized by Congress and the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Assessment Criteria

Staff has assessed the proposals to determine whether they meet the Federal CDBG regulations and address the priorities identified within the City of Ashland 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan.

Three areas are evaluated for each proposal regarding compliance with federal regulations.

- Projects must meet the National Objective of the Community Development Block Grant Program.
- All CDBG funded projects must be an "eligible" use under the Community Development Block Grant Program.
- If a project meets all federal requirements and is selected for award, then federal regulations must be met throughout the course of the project.

Some examples of federal regulations which pertain to Community Development Block Grant funded projects are; all projects funded in whole or in part, with CDBG dollars require an environmental review in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). Certain construction projects must use federal Davis-Bacon wage rates. Housing involving structures built prior to 1978 must be tested for the presence of Lead Based Paint and if found steps to mitigate Lead Based Paint must be taken. Any project involving the displacement of residents or businesses as a result of the federally funded project are entitled to assistance under the Uniform Relocation Act. Most importantly the beneficiaries from the application of CDBG funds must qualify as eligible populations under the Federal requirements for the CDBG program. Areas of concern are described for each proposal received. The Housing and Human Services Commission and the City Council can only award CDBG funds to projects that can meet all federal requirements and meets an objective as outlined in the City's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan.

Priorities within the City of Ashland's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan are given a priority ranking of High, Medium, or Low. The rankings are intended to assist in directing CDBG funds to the greatest needs. In cases where there are competing projects for limited funds, the projects(s) that are ranked the highest will be funded.



Public Service Proposal Evaluation

St. Vincent De Paul-Home Visitation Program

Staff has reviewed the St. Vincent de Paul (SVDP) program proposal to determine whether it meets the Federal CDBG regulations, and if the proposal addresses the priorities within the City of Ashland 2015-2019 Consolidated plan. St. Vincent's has requested \$20,000 to assist homeless and at-risk populations in obtaining and maintaining housing.

- This project proposal qualifies under the Low-Moderate Income (LMI) benefit national objective.
- Generally, income payments (payments to an individual or family, which are used to provide basic services such as food, shelter (including payment for rent, mortgage, and/or utilities) are ineligible public service activities when such payments are provided as a grant. However, such expenditures are eligible if; the income payments do not exceed three consecutive months; and the payments are made directly to the provider of services on behalf of an individual or family. This project meets those criteria.
- St. Vincent has a proven capacity to administer CDBG grant funding, this would be SVDP's sixth year of undertaking this activity in Ashland.
- SVDP expects to assist 38-45 individuals attain or maintain housing.
- Staff finds that SVDP's proposal would merit a priority of high on the priority ranking identified within the City of Ashland's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan.

Staff has determined that St. Vincent's proposal is an eligible use of CDBG funds and is consistent with the City of Ashland Strategies as outlined in the 5-year Consolidated Plan. This activity assists in the prevention of homelessness for low-income and special needs households. Further this project meets and exceeds the 10% leverage requirement of the City of Ashland's CDBG program providing 10 times the requested grant funds leveraging additional funding from other sources. The St. Vincent De Paul Home Visitation Program has successfully administered Community Development Block grant funds for the past seven years.

Maslow Project-School Based Services for Ashland Homeless Youth

Staff has reviewed the Maslow Project, School Based Services for Ashland Homeless Youth Proposal to determine whether it meets the Federal CDBG regulations, and if the proposal addresses the priorities within the City of Ashland 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan. Maslow Project requested \$10,000 in Public Service Grant funds to continue to support a case manager in the elementary, middle and high schools, providing outreach to high risk homeless youth and providing them with immediate needs, case management to keep youth engaged in school and promote stability and self-sufficiency for the homeless youth and their families.

- This project proposal qualifies under the Low-Moderate Income (LMI) benefit national objective; homeless populations are a presumed benefit population under the CDBG program.
- Services to homeless and at-risk populations are an eligible use of CDBG funds.
- Maslow's proposal expects to provide services to 85-90 identified homeless school children currently enrolled in the Ashland School District.
- Maslow Project has proven capacity to administer CDBG grant funds-this would be Maslow's fifth year of undertaking this activity in Ashland.
- Staff finds that Maslow Project's proposal is consistent with goals identified in the City of Ashland's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan.



In evaluating the proposal, it is evident that the proposed project has a priority ranking of High.

Staff has determined that Maslow Project's proposal is an eligible use of CDBG funds and is consistent with the City of Ashland Strategies as outlined in the 5-year Consolidated Plan. This activity assists in the prevention of homelessness for low-income households. Maslow has successfully administered this program within the Ashland School District for the past five years. Furthermore, this project meets and exceeds the 10% leverage requirement of the City of Ashland's CDBG program and leveraging funding from other sources.

Capital Improvement Proposals

Ashland Housing Opportunities, Inc./Options for Southern Oregon (AHO)- Star Thistle Complex Repairs

Staff has reviewed the Ashland Housing Opportunities (AHO) proposal to determine whether it meets the Federal CDBG regulations, and if the proposal addresses the priorities within the City of Ashland's 2015-2019 Consolidated plan. AHO has requested \$49,653 in grant funds to complete needed repairs to an existing affordable housing complex serving 11 special needs low-income qualified households.

- This project proposal qualifies under the Low-Moderate Income (LMI) and Presumed benefit national objective.
- Rehabilitation and upgrades are eligible uses of CDBG Capital Improvement funds.
- AHO has not previously administered CDBG funding within the City of Ashland.
- Staff finds that the AHO proposal is consistent with priority goals identified in the City of Ashland's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan.

Staff sees that Family Solution's proposal is an eligible use of the CDBG funds and is consistent with the City of Ashland Strategies as outlined in the 5-year Consolidated Plan. This activity meets the 10% leverage requirement of the City of Ashland's CDBG program.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS

Staff recommends award of the 2017-2018 CDBG funds as follows:

- \$49,653 to Ashland Housing Opportunities for the repairs to the Star Thistle Facility
- \$16,665 to St. Vincent De Paul Home Visitation Program
- \$7,143 to Maslow Project School Based Services
- The City would also like to direct the balance of prior year's unallocated CDBG funds, which is a total of \$117,779, to Habitat for Humanity for the purchase of 4 deed restricted affordable lots, pending environmental review and planning approval.

Staff's recommendations are based on evaluation of CDBG eligibility, the City's five-year Consolidated Plan Goals, agency experience and capacity, and readiness to proceed.

Public Service Projects: Only 15% of the overall allocation is available for public service activities, as only \$23,808 in funding is available, both projects cannot be fully funded with CDBG. Consequently,



staff is proposing a 70%/30% proportional allocation of the funding which is consistent with prior years' allocations. In examining the two applications for public service funding staff found both to be needed activities within the Ashland community that would benefit CDBG eligible populations. Both the SVDP program and the Maslow Project have successful track records of administering federal grant funds, providing counseling services, resource referrals and, in the case of the SVDP Home Visitation program, direct financial assistance to the homeless and those at risk of homelessness. The Maslow project's proposed activity would continue to benefit homeless populations as well but with an emphasis on homeless children enrolled in Ashland schools.

Capital Projects:

Ashland Housing Opportunities, Inc.

The City received one capital project proposal; Ashland Housing Opportunities, Inc. The project qualifies as eligible uses of CDBG funds, the project is ready to proceed and would be able to expend the funds in a timely manner thereby allowing the City to meet its timeliness cap. While Affordable Housing Solutions has not previously administered a CDBG grant in the City of Ashland, AHS and Options have years of relevant experience administering other HUD funded programs and activities and have the administrative capacity to undertake the proposed activity which is a relatively simple and straightforward. Both the timeline for completion and the budget for the activity is well thought out and achievable. Matching funds have been identified and secured, the project serves an eligible population.

Habitat for Humanity

The City did not receive a CDBG application from Rogue Valley Habitat for Humanity for the acquisition of property to develop 4 affordable housing units in Ashland. However, Habitat for Humanity did submit an application for Affordable Housing Trust Funds. The project described in that AHTF application would be an eligible use of CDBG funds. In the event the City were to award \$117,779 in CDBG funds in support of this project, Habitat for Humanity could acquire the property described pending environmental review and planning approval. Rogue Valley Habitat for Humanity has considerable experience in housing development and in administering CDBG funded projects. These lots would be required to be affordable through the City of Ashland Land Use Code requirements for zone changes. An application for a zone change is to be reviewed by the City Council on March 20, 2018. Which, if approved, would require these units to be affordable to comply with the zone change criteria. The award would be dependent upon land use and environmental review approval. Staff is making this recommendation because the request for Affordable Housing Trust Funds exceeded the amount available for award. However, CDBG capital project funding that is remaining from prior years allocations was not requested, and would be available for award to a project that could expend the funds in an timely manner, and support the development of affordable housing such as Habitat for Humanity's AHTF proposal to acquire land.

The City of Ashland has received five applications for \$366,000 in competitively available Affordable Housing Trust Funds (AHTF). The City of Ashland Housing and Human Services Commission will hold a public hearing on March 22, 2018 to review the grant requests and make a recommendation to forward to the City Council for consideration. The Council will make the final award selections at a public hearing scheduled for April 17, 2018. Staff's assessment of each of the proposals received, and recommendations regarding the allocation of the 2018 AHTF funds are provided on the following pages.

Funding Requested/Available

A total of approximately \$366,00 in AHTF is expected to be available to distribute to applicants for projects meeting the priorities of the AHTF policies as defined by resolution 2008-34, and which are consistent with the City of Ashland 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan priorities.

Assessment Criteria

Staff has assessed the proposals to determine whether they meet the guidelines established by resolution 2008-34. Three areas are evaluated for each proposal.

- Applicants must meet the criteria outlined in Section 2; Eligible Applicants.
- Proposed activities must be eligible as detailed in Section 3; Eligible Uses and Activities.
- Is the activity a preferred activity as defined in Section 4; Preferences.

Preferences within resolution 2008-34 are not given a priority. There are ten preferences identified in Section 4. Projects that meet an identified preference are noted in the preference column.

Resolution 2008-34 also states that proposed activities should meet a priority identified within the City of Ashland's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan. Consolidated Plan priorities are given a priority ranking of High, Medium, or Low. Those priorities are shown in the table above.



Proposal Evaluation

Columbia Care: Staff has reviewed the Columbia Care proposal to determine whether it meets the eligibility criteria for uses and for applicants and if the proposal addresses the preferences within section 4 of resolution 2008-34.

- The project is providing new affordable housing.
- The agency submitting the proposal has the capacity to carry out the project and has had demonstrated success completing projects of similar scope
- The project is ready for implementation, has secured a purchase option.
- The budget and timeline are thorough and realistic.
- The project addresses unmet housing needs as identified in the Housing Needs Analysis and Consolidated Plan.
- The project retains the units as affordable.

OHRA: Staff has reviewed the OHRA Proposals to determine whether they meet the eligibility criteria for uses and for applicants and if the proposal addresses the preferences within section 4 of resolution 2008-34.

Short Term

- The agency submitting the proposal has the capacity to carry out the project and has had demonstrated success completing projects of similar scope.
- The project maximizes partnerships in the community

Medium-Term

- The agency submitting the proposal has the capacity to carry out the project and has had demonstrated success completing projects of similar scope
- The project is ready for implementation
- This project will not duplicate a service provided by another organization.
- The proposal demonstrates that AHTF are the most appropriate funding source.

Long Term

- The project is providing new affordable housing.
- The project addresses unmet housing needs as identified in the Housing Needs Analysis and Consolidated Plan.
- This project will not duplicate a service provided by another organization.
- The proposal demonstrates that AHTF are the most appropriate funding source.

Rogue Valley Habitat for Humanity: Staff has reviewed the Habitat proposal to determine whether it meets the eligibility criteria for uses and for applicants and if the proposal addresses the preferences within section 4 of resolution 2008-34.

- The project is providing new affordable housing.
- The agency submitting the proposal has the capacity to carry out the project and has had demonstrated success completing projects of similar scope
- The project addresses unmet housing needs as identified in the Housing Needs Analysis and Consolidated Plan.
- The project retains the units as affordable.



STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS

Staff's recommendations are based on evaluation of applicant and activity eligibility, program preferences and the City's five-year Consolidated Plan Goals, agency experience and capacity, and readiness to proceed with the activity.

Staff recommends award of the 2018 AHTF funds as follows:

- \$347,000 to Columbia Care
- \$19,000 to OHRA

Staff is recommending that the majority of the funding (\$347,000) be awarded to Columbia Care for the development of affordable housing as that proposal addresses the most preferences of any proposal submitted as outlined in resolution 2008-34 and it is clear that Affordable Housing Trust Funds are the most appropriate funding source for this activity.

Staff is recommending funding \$19,000 to OHRA's medium term application. Staff finds this proposal to fund predevelopment activities associated with development of OHRA land on Washington Street is an eligible use of AHTF funding. Staff would also like to recommend that OHRA work closely with planning staff on this project, specifically regarding the land use, planning, and building processes. Staff would also recommend shifting \$4,000 of AHTF funding in the proposed budget for this activity from the community needs assessment to addressing the land use and annexation assessment to determine the properties development capacity.

Staff is not recommending funding OHRA's short term proposal with the AHTF as that proposal does not meet as many preferences as the competing proposals submitted, and it is not clear that the AHTF is the most appropriate source of funding for this activity. Staff does encourage OHRA to submit this proposal for funding under the City of Ashland Social Service Grant program in January 2019. Staff is not recommending funding the OHRA long term proposal at this time, as staff feels that it would be more prudent to await the outcome of the needs assessment and land use/zoning predevelopment activities.

Staff is recommending that Habitat for Humanity utilize Community Development Block Grant funding rather than AHTF for the purchase of the lots. These lots would be required to be affordable through the City of Ashland Land Use Code requirements for zone changes. An application for a zone change is to be reviewed by the City Council on March 20, 2018. Which, if approved, would require these units to be affordable to comply with the zone change criteria. The award would be dependent upon land use and environmental review approval. The request for Affordable Housing Trust Funds exceeded the amount available for award. However, CDBG capital project funding was not requested, and would be available for award to Habitat for Humanity in support of their proposal.
